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The USA's renewed commitments to international climate efforts

The United States of America has for a very long time been the unrivalled global political-economic superpower, and this has far-reaching implications for the global community. Its political-economic status enables it to influence international trade and markets, as well as the regulations, laws and institutions that govern international relations – mostly for its own benefit. In recent years this has had worrying consequences for climate change.

This was exacerbated by some of President Donald Trump's policy decisions. During his term the USA formally withdrew from important international treaties and agreements, including the 2015 Paris agreement that aims at reducing carbon emissions and addressing climate change. https://bit.ly/3oh0bpG

Joe Biden ran on an election campaign that included a progressive climate plan, in which he proposed spending US\$2 trillion and creating millions of new jobs to pivot the country to clean energy and netzero carbon emissions by no later than 2050. https://bit.ly/2LUGGq6

Within hours of taking office, President Biden signed directives to re-enter the Paris agreement, and indicated a more decisive move from fossil fuels to renewable energy sources. https://bit.ly/2YaAVH5

This gesture is further supported by the appointment of cabinet members with experience in environmental issues and climate justice.
